COURSE DESCRIPTION

An examination of the New Testament Writings with attention to contemporary methods of Biblical criticism

OUTCOMES/OBJECTIVES

Students will understand a general overview of the New Testament, its historical context, and methodologies for interpreting ancient Middle Eastern Texts in general.

Students will be able to identify the various genre of the New Testament and how these genre might be helpful in the interpretation of texts.

Students will learn to critique in a general way the various methodologies for New Testament interpretation.

Students will develop a rudimentary system of New Testament interpretation based not only upon professional scholarship but also present day experiential contexts.

Students will develop an understanding of the direction New Testament scholarship is moving with regard to understandings of Jesus and Paul.
